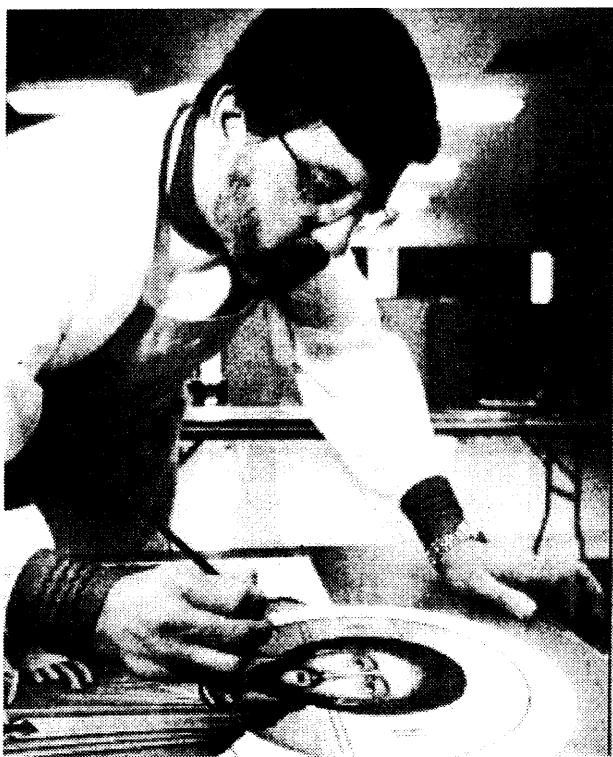

25 years ago, Dennis Bell saw the need for an Orthodox Church east of Cleveland where no Orthodox parish existed. His seemingly humble efforts resulted in the establishment of St. Nicholas Orthodox Church in Mentor. Over the last quarter century, St. Nicholas has nurtured faithful from Cuyahoga, Lake, Geauga, Summit and Ashtabula Counties. Dennis, a Vietnam Veteran, has a Bachelors and Masters Degree in Music Education and served as a teacher in the Mentor School system for many years. He also served the parish as the first Council President and Choir Director. Dennis is also a tonsured Reader and now makes his living as an Iconographer. His icons hang in churches across the United States and overseas.

His Goal: A New Church

A music teacher at Shore Junior High in Mentor is attempting to establish Lake County's first Eastern Orthodox Church.

Dennis Bell, 1157 Crescent Dr., Painesville, said since he moved to that city a year ago, he has had to commute to Cleveland each Sunday to attend church services.

Bell said he believes there must be other persons of Greek or Russian extraction (his mother was Russian) in the area who are doing the same thing.

So he decided to contact as

many as possible to see if they would be willing to set up a local Church.

"I've had great response," he said.

BELL SAID at least a dozen families in the Painesville, Mentor and Chardon area have contacted him since he began putting up printed posters in store windows.

The Eastern Orthodox Church is especially dominant in Eastern Europe, Western Asia and North Africa.

It originally consisted of four patriarchates (Constantinople, Alexandria, Antioch and Jerusalem)

which had rejected the authority of the Roman See in 1054.

It since has spread throughout the United States, the Soviet Union, Greece, Romania and Bulgaria, where several autonomous churches have been established.

A meeting will be held at 7:30 p.m. Saturday at First Church Congregational, Mentor Avenue and Liberty Street, Painesville, for persons who want to know how to establish the church here.

Bell said priests from several groups will be present. The meeting will be open to

anyone interested in the movement.

"The Syrian Archdiocese, Russian Orthodox Church and Greek Orthodox Archdiocese have all offered to sponsor a new church here," Bell noted.

"We will probably rent another sanctuary to meet Sundays until we can afford to build a church," he said.

Bell moved here a year ago from the Warren-Youngstown area, where he said there are many Eastern Orthodox Churches.
